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Title I Programming Information

As a recipient of Title I, Part D Funds, the Rutherford County Juvenile Detention Center provides several programming opportunities to the youth who are detained in our facility. The goals of Title I, Part D, are to : (1) improve educational services for these children so they have the opportunity to meet challenging State academic content and achievement standards; (2) provide them with services to successfully transition from institutionalization to further schooling or employment; and (3) prevent youth who are at-risk from dropping out of school, and to provide dropouts and children and youth returning from correctional facilities with a support system to ensure their continued education.

Programming at the Rutherford County Juvenile Detention Center focuses on these goals in a variety of ways. Youth detained at the facility participate in various programming opportunities pertinent to their needs. Some of the programming opportunities are outlined below.

Pet Partners—Pet Partner Teams visit with the young people in Juvenile Detention. The teams interact with the kids through educating them about dog safety, demonstrating ways to train a dog, and the importance of trust in all types of relationships.

On My Own—This hands-on, real life simulation gives young people the opportunity to experience their futures in a fun and exciting way. They are encouraged to make healthy and wise lifestyle choices similar to those adults face on a daily basis. Students explore careers and receive a monthly salary based on the career they choose. Then, they proceed through “real life” deducting taxes, building savings accounts, paying bills, and balancing their budgets. Students are taught to write checks and balance their checkbooks along the way. In the end, students learn about money management and evaluate their choices.

PLATO Courseware—PLATO Learning addresses the needs of at-risk learners via a web based learning opportunity. The online learning experience is filled with rich media graphics, video and interactivity. The curriculum focuses on identifying gaps in the learner’s knowledge and identifying obstacles in moving forward. Pretests, practice exercises and post tests give students the opportunity to identify their needs, work through them and become successful learners.

GOAL Program—Greater Opportunities for Additional Learning Program uses volunteer facilitators as guest speakers. These guest speakers deliver presentations on a variety of topics such as building self-esteem, career goals, communication skills, conflict resolution, substance abuse awareness, life skills and a variety of health issues. Detained youth have the opportunity to attend these presentations and participate in interactive question and answer sessions.

Real World Health—The Rutherford County Health Department Health Educators visit regularly to teach a series of lessons that focus on healthy relationships, sexual respect and safety. Students learn about protecting themselves, making responsible decisions and avoiding risky behaviors.

TEENS in ACTION—This high-energy, video based program is designed especially for adolescents. The program teaches important communication skills while helping teens understand the dangers of risky behavior and how to avoid it. Additionally, the program focuses on helping teens understand changes in their bodies and brains; teaching them to communicate in a mature way with adults; developing skills for resisting negative peer pressure and learning techniques for peaceful conflict resolution.

ACTIVE Parenting of Teens—This program provides parents with the skills they need to meet the challenges of parenting teens and preteens in today's turbulent society. Each of the six sessions in the series include hands-on activities, group discussions and informational videos. Parenting classes are ongoing and there is no charge for the class.

ARISE Life Management Skills—This all encompassing life skills curricula is an interactive way to capture the attention of easily distracted youth. These sessions are held in small groups. Trained staff facilitators lead the groups which address such topics as anger management, substance abuse awareness, self-esteem, preventing violence, health and hygiene, job readiness and a variety of other pertinent issues.

In addition to the specially structured programs, there are several continuous resources available to the youth such as a newly remodeled library which contains over 1,000 scholastic approved books. The youth have the opportunity to visit the library and check out books to read on their own. A computer lab in the housing area is available as a resource for online learning opportunities which include the PLATO learning project but they can also be utilized to help the youth complete on-line assignments from their home schools while they are detained. Also, throughout the housing area, the youth can find literature cases with information about a variety of issues with topics including mental health, improving school performance and life skills.

The Rutherford County Juvenile Detention Center is committed to providing detained youth with the resources they need to become successful upon their release. New programs are added regularly and we are constantly looking for ways to improve our current programming schedule.
